### Dennis W. Ashley, M.D.

received his bachelor's degree from Transylvania University in Lexington, Kentucky and his MD degree from the University of Kentucky. He completed his general surgery residency at the Medical Center of Central Georgia and Mercer University School of Medicine. This was followed by a

trauma fellowship at Grady Hospital, Emory University School of Medicine, in Atlanta and a surgical critical care fellowship at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center in Pittsburgh. Dr. Ashley is the Director of Trauma and Critical Care Services at the Medical Center of Central Georgia and Professor of Surgery at Mercer University School of Medicine. A Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, Dr. Ashley is also a member of numerous other medical societies, including the American Association for the Surgery of Trauma, the Eastern Association for the Surgery of Trauma, the Society of Critical Care Medicine, and the Southern Surgical Association. He is currently the Chairman of the American College of Surgeons Georgia Committee on Trauma and the Georgia Trauma Care Network Commission.

### Educational Objectives

The educational objectives for this conference are to become apprised of the management of hunting-related blunt injuries; To become informed as to the availability and usage of massive resuscitation; To become informed of the current management of giant gastrointestinal stromal tumors; To understand the difficulties and progress in the development of a statewide trauma system; To discuss breast cancer frequency and prognosis in premenopausal women; To address myths and truths regarding breast cancer etiology and risk factors in young women; To review approaches to breast cancer therapy in young women; Become knowledgeable of those risk factors shown to be associated with breast cancer in this group of women; Learn standard approaches to therapy; Come to understand the challenges faced in diagnosis, treatment and follow-up of these premenopausal women; To understand the natural history of abdominal aortic aneurysms and when intervention is indicated; To understand the differences in the open approach and the endovascular approach for repair of abdominal aortic aneurysm.

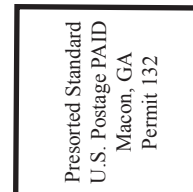

## VISITING FACULTY



**Julie A. Freischlag, M.D.** is The William Stewart Halsted Professor, Chair of the Department of Surgery and Surgeon-in-Chief at The Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, Maryland. She came to Johns Hopkins in 2003, from the University of California in Los Angeles, where she was Chief of

the Vascular Surgery Division and Director of the Gonda (Goldschmied) Vascular Center. Dr. Freischlag completed her surgical residency and post residency vascular fellowship at UCLA.

Before Dr. Freischlag returned to work at UCLA, she was a Professor of Surgery at the Medical College of Wisconsin where she was also the Vice Chair of the Vascular Surgery Section and Chief of Surgery at Zablocki VA Medical Center.

Dr. Freischlag is recognized nationally and internationally as an expert in the diagnosis and treatment of thoracic outlet syndrome. She is presently conducting a quality of life study on all patients before and years after surgical intervention for this disease. She is the national principal investigator of the VA OVER trial (Open Versus Endovascular Repair) of abdominal aortic aneurysms. The study is a prospective randomized trial which has already randomized over 800 patients from 34 medical centers across the country. She is the Editor of the *Archives of Surgery* which is one of the major surgical journals. She also serves on several other editorial boards. She has published over 150 manuscripts, numerous abstracts and book chapters.



**Harvey L. Bumpers, M.D.** is currently Professor of Surgery and the Interim Chair of the Department of Surgery at Morehouse School of Medicine. He is also Director of Surgical Oncology and the Breast Service at Grady Hospital for Morehouse. In addition to this, he runs a fully functional research

laboratory at Morehouse focused on breast and colorectal cancer using animal models. The present research involves using a novel therapy that was patented at Morehouse to inhibit the growth and metastasis of human colorectal and breast cancers.

Dr. Bumpers graduated from the University of Rochester School of Medicine in 1982. His general surgery training

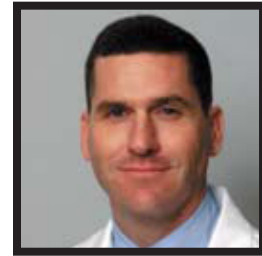
was accomplished at State University of New York at Stony Brook, Long Island, NY and he did a two year cancer research fellowship at Stony Brook. He then did an additional fellowship in surgical oncology at Roswell Park Cancer Institute in Buffalo, 1989-1991. Following that training, he served on the surgical faculty at the University of Buffalo School of Medicine for five years. Dr. Bumpers has been on the faculty at Morehouse since August, 1996. He has authored 44 peer-reviewed publications and has obtained extramural grants from the NIH and the Department of Defense.

**Andrew L. Foret, M.D.** is a fourth year resident in the Mercer University School of Medicine General Surgery Residency Program at the Medical Center of Central Georgia. He is a native of Lake Charles, Louisiana. He

received his medical degree from LSU in New Orleans and his undergraduate degree from LSU in Baton Rouge where he majored in zoology. Dr. Foret is pursuing a hand surgery fellowship upon completion of his general surgery training.



**Mark D. Herndon, M.D.**, a fourth year resident in the Mercer Program received his medical degree from MCG in Augusta and his undergraduate degree from the University of South Carolina at Columbia. He served in the U.S.

Air Force for seven years rising to the rank of Captain before deciding to pursue a career in medicine. He is a native of Greenville, South Carolina and plans to return to Augusta to practice general surgery with his father-in-law upon completion of his surgery training.



**W. Clinton Streetman, M.D.**, also a fourth year resident in the Mercer Program, received his degree in medicine from UAB at Birmingham. Dr. Streetman's undergraduate education was carried out at UAB as well where
